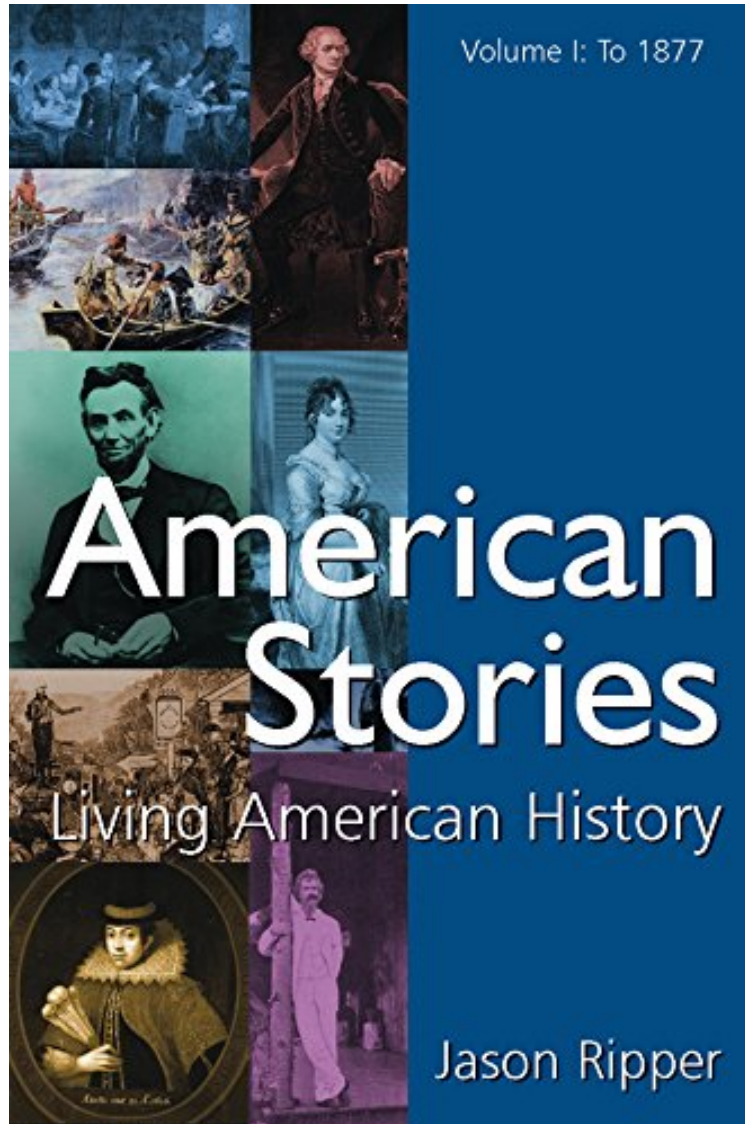

Their home in South Carolina had no windows, no air conditioning, no phone, nothing but their will power and the relationships they forged with their "pupils" and families. Ripper brings their story to life, and the time difference between then and now vanishes.It doesn't matter which decade he refers to; he is able to meld American history with American values and

culture. There is an unusual vibrancy in his language which enables history to flow quickly and easily. The reader can almost see Edisto Island or the 1893 World's Fair in Chicago where "brand name products like Pabst Blue Ribbon beer and Juicy Fruit gum tickled the coins out of the pockets of 27 million fairgoers...." How about "newness was America's tonic" to talk about the new technologies of 1900 or "The 1920s are commercial radio; black jazz men jazzing up white-only dance halls; Ku Klux Klan rallies in the heart of Washington, D.C..." to bring the reader not only into the past but to see how past remains present in many instances. The reader can learn political history, social history, cultural history, stories of politicians, writers, and ordinary people. The language Ripper uses, the way he connects phrases and ideas is what makes this history book so attractive. This is fun reading. Students like what they are reading. It makes sense because they can see it and feel it. On top of that the reader gets a full array of facts and themes. It is hard to imagine a better value.
