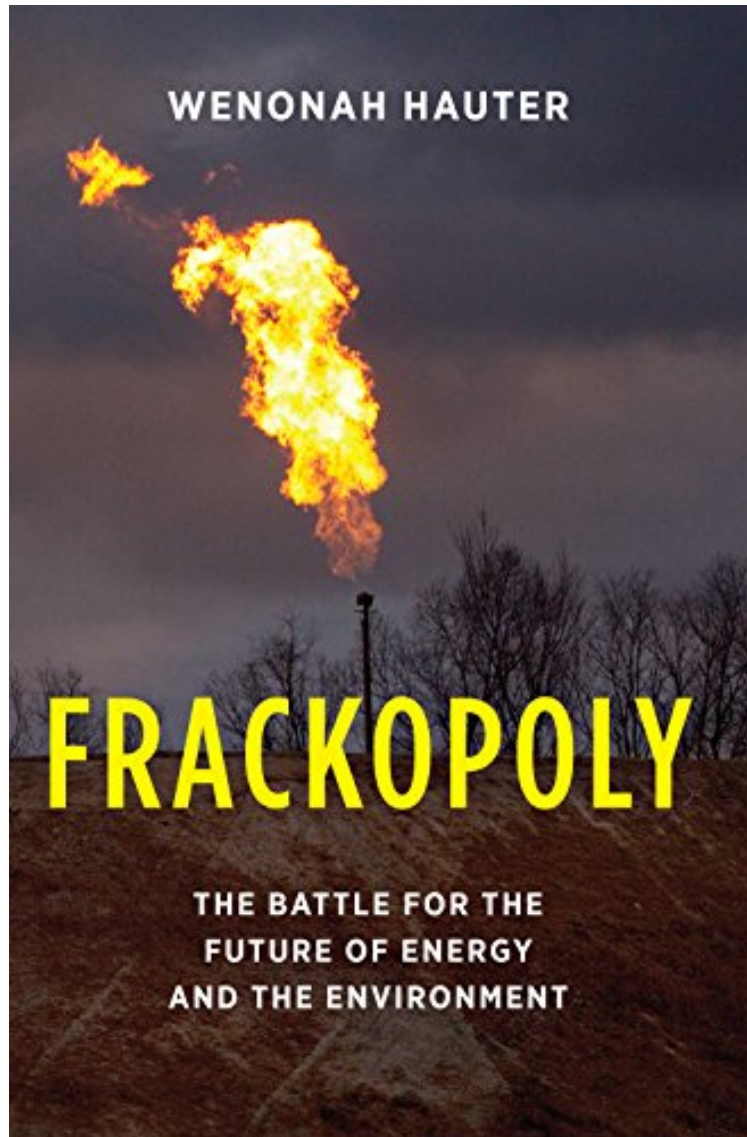

Watching advertising from the American Petroleum Industry on the television I had to ask myself "what's their angle?" After all why does this organization need to advertise to the public? I had to read Frackopoly to see the other side. Of course anybody can write a book about anything that he or she has a willingness to do so. Having the right connections a person get a work published. This does not guarantee the authenticity of the information. However, Wenonah Hauter does excellent research in this effort. Hauter documents her research with verifiable end notes. Verifiable, in that from the sources she provides the reader can check the accuracy of these sources from other independent sources, should the reader be so inclined. This is important to me because this day in age it seems everyone has, "an angle", whether it is pro-industry, pro-worker, pro-environment or pro-anything. Being pro-anything does not mean honesty will be a part of the agenda, just getting the target audience on board is what is important. Hauter presents her case here in a matter of fact manner, with well documented research. Frackopoly is well worth the read.
