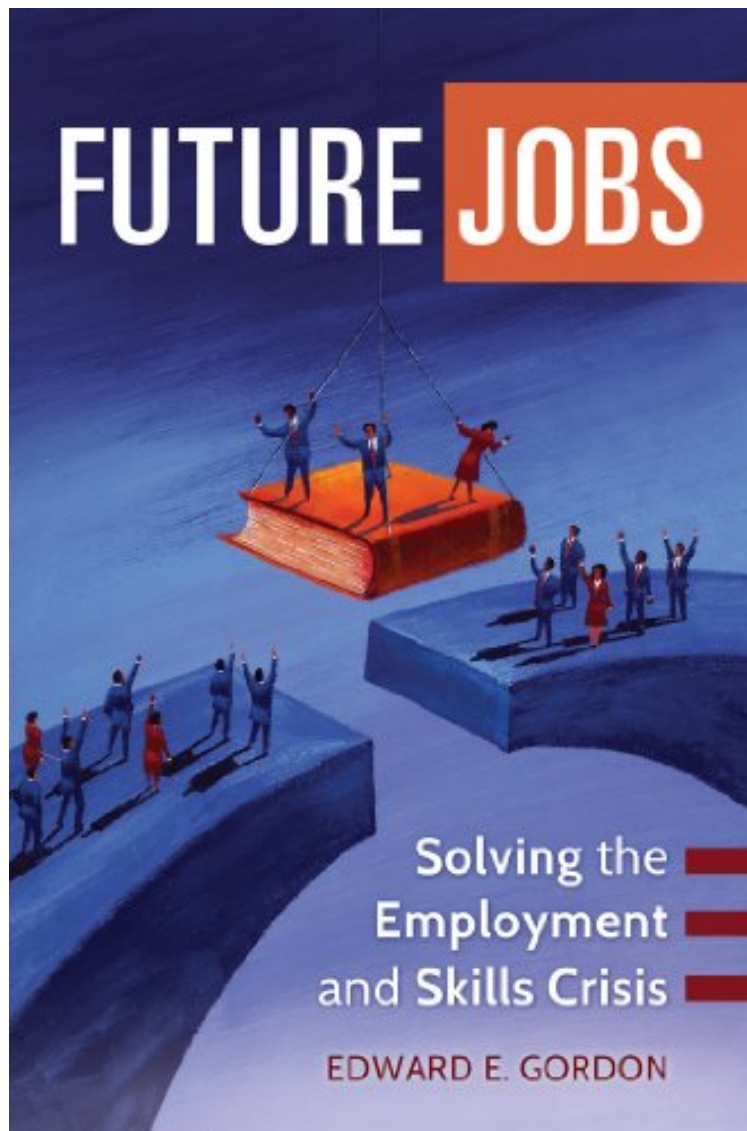

This book is full of convincing data, and the discussion makes for a dynamic statement about the current crisis in employment outcomes. Any parent with a high school or college age student should read this book; the student himself or herself should also read it. What makes the book particularly effective are the comparisons Gordon makes with other global economies and the recommendations for how this crisis can be solved.
