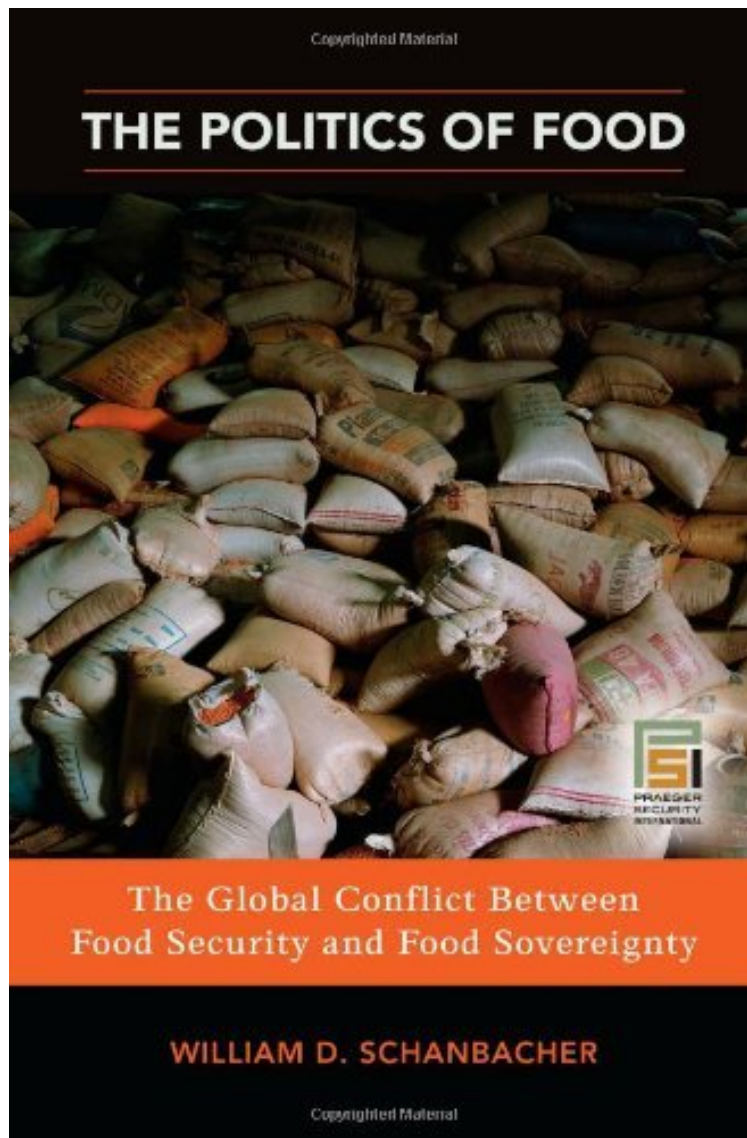

It almost feels like the kind of reading you'd find in a textbook. That being said, I learned a TON about the world of food politics, which is what I was looking for at the end of the day. If you are interested in the idea of food sovereignty, understanding the difference between the United Nations approach to food sovereignty and how the policies of the World Trade Organization, World Bank, IMF, etc effect the food supply, global hunger and poverty, this book will provide you with all of that. It also covers a few case studies, the slow food movement and lays out a (believe it or not) considerably pragmatic approach to reduce global poverty. 3 of 4 people found the following review helpful. It presents politics, health, and social frameworks to explain the food sovereignty issues ("the political/human right of a community or country to determine its own policies regarding food security") and food security issues ("provision of sufficient and predictable food supplies through planned reserves or through stable markets"). You may want to read another review for this book at the New Agriculturalist website. Another book that you might find more helpful in understanding social change is: *Ways of Social Change: Making Sense of Modern Times* by Garth Massey. It is an easier read than McMichael (see my reference). They cover similar subjects, but McMichael covers more subjects apace and with a sharper tone.
